RANGER IN CHARGE REPORT:

Churchill Island and surrounds. The new visitor centre is superb so if you haven't been yet, come along and enjoy. This centre is a great "Focis" for all our visitors and will go a long way in keeping the island afloat financially!

We now have a new entry gate at the tourist road entrance. Nice chunky gates made from cypress pine. The fencing either side of the gate is traditional split post and wire. This gives it a true old farm feel.

The old toilet block has been demolished and the materials kept and stored away. These will be used to construct a new 'old hen house' and a smiddy for blacksmithing and horse shoeing. (smiddy? Is that Scottish or something Scott?)

We have been busy cutting and painting boxthorn, thistle chipping and rabbit control work in the area that runs from the bridge to Churchill Road. This is the area seen across the water on your left as you drive up to the visitor centre. This coastal reserve area is now looking great with lots of native re-growth. Due in total to the removal of box thorn and rabbits.

Sophie and Lolly our resident Clydesdale horses are both going really well with lots of hard work! They were part of the New Year's Eve Parade that required them to be driven through the Cowes main street. After the parade they were driven all the way back to Churchill Island, passed by hundreds of cars on the way. If Lolly could speak she would have called me a few well chosen names!! Not because of the traffic but the distance!

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They both also gave carriage rides at the Wonthaggi Show. These public appearances give excellent promotion for Churchill Island.

A new walking/bicycle track is being constructed from the main road tourist road entrance to the Churchill bridge. The track meanders through some very special vegetation types.

Our hay season went well. We cut and baled about 250 small bales. The horse drawn side rake was the best thing since sliced bread. All thanks to Ron Hocking and Jan his wife for their determination in carrying out this very hard restoration.

This spring and summer have so far been the busiest I have seen ever. But I might add. it has not spoilt the serenity of this special place.

Those of you who have had a long association with our lovely island will be having a little chuckle at this Jilly-come-lately realisation, but you are the very people I would like to acknowledge.

Churchill Island, Amess House and Rogers' Cottages, the surrounding buildings, the gardens, trees, access paths and roads all owe a debt of gratitude to those who have gone before us.

Since its acquisition by the Victorian Government in 1976 a veritable parade of dedicated workers and volunteers have been committed to and caring of Churchill Island. As I went through the old newsletters the same names appear year after year. Churchill Island's garden has not suffered too much so far this summer due to the mild weather and the wonderful rain we have had. Everything is looking lush the Magnolia Grandiflora has had huge citrus-scented flowers and the Jacarandas left a beautiful purple carpet of petals on the homestead pathway in January.

The apples, plums, figs and mulberries are in fruit much to the birds' delight. The silkworms have hatched into moths and are laying hundreds of eggs everywhere!

The Canary Island Smokebush (Bystropogon canariensis) flowered abundantly in front of Rogers Cottage and put on a lovely show for the summer visitors.

The Garden History Society recently paid a most enjoyable visit to Churchill Island thus further cementing their ongoing relationship with the historic gardens. Their contribution has been much appreciated.

PERSONALITY PROFILE:

Sally O'Neill's transfer to the KCC, in her inimitable mobile office, will be a loss to Churchill Island, but we wish her every success in the new venture. As Project Officer for the last two and a half years, she watched over the transformation of the Island's amenities, the refurbishing of Amess House and the building of the Visitors Centre, and piloted the bi-centennial celebrations to a resounding success.

Sally came to the Nature Park as a Ranger in 1990 and quickly became Ranger in Charge of Education and Interpretation. After a two year interval, working in Kakadu, she returned as Project Officer in charge of formulating a master plan of development for Churchill Island, developing a system of interpretation, and refurbishing Amess House and Rogers' Cottage. She had Miles Lewis's initial report on which to base her planning, but decided to set the refurbishment of the house in a single homogeneous time-frame, and worked closely with the National Trust to achieve it.

She has also set her own agenda with a keen historical eye, collecting a small library of primary materials about the history of the Island, making contact with the early families and the Bunurong Land Council, and unearthing important information that has not previously been on the public The excellent arrangement of some of this material in the Visitors Centre speaks volumes for Sally's determination to make the record as complete as it can be. Her one disappointment was the negative result of the weekend search for the foundations of James Grant's fabled "blockhouse". She feels the discovery would be a huge tourist attraction, and is something Heritage Victoria might well work on. "It hasn't really yet been put to bed", She is committed to getting Museum accreditation for the house and the collection, and has dreams of a computer system to manage it.

She has had a major input into the planning of the new Visitors Centre, and was involved in all the site meetings and landscaping plans, as well, of course, as the ingenious signage and displays which are universally admired. Likewise she piloted the fine new stables, which, like everything else, have been worked on in close consultation with Heritage Victoria. Sally's contribution to Churchill Island is by no means over, but already one may say of her: "If you want a memorial, look about you".

But we shall miss, above all, her laughter, her ready charm and skill with people. She has created a fine heritage display, but, for her, the most enjoyable aspect of it has been meeting the living people. "That's what made it for me," she says.

We hope koalas and the new KCC development will be as much fun. Good luck, Sally!



WORLD'S FIRST NATIONAL MATTHEW FLINDERS EXHIBITION OPENS AT CHURCHILL ISLAND

The world's first national touring exhibition on the intrepid British explorer, Matthew Flinders, will open at the Churchill Island Visitor Centre on 6th February 2002 to mark the bicentenary of his epic circumnavigation of Australia (1801-03).

The exhibition coordinated by the West Gippsland Regional Library Corporation and Phillip Island Nature Park has been made possible by funding support from the Victorian Minister for Local Government, the Hon Bob Cameron.

Matthew Flinders: The Ultimate Voyage presents stunning 18th century treasures and illustrated displays exploring the drama, tragedy, romance and achievements of this historical hero.

The New South Wales State Librarian & Chief Executive Dagmar Schmidmaier said: "This landmark exhibition will showcase wonderful material relating to Flinders and his significant voyages of discovery that are often overlooked in Australia's history."

In just 23 years, from 1791 to 1814, Flinders transported breadfruit with William Bligh; explored coastal NSW; charted Bass Strait and Tasmania; circumnavigated and named Australia; was shipwrecked; imprisoned at Mauritius; experimented on the effect of magnetism in ships; and wrote a legendary book on Australian exploration.

The epic circumnavigation of Australia aboard the leaky and rotting *HMS Investigator* was an incident packed adventure and resulted in Flinders not only naming Australia, but hundreds of places throughout, such as the Great Australian Bight and Kangaroo Island.

What's most extraordinary is that he did all of this before his early death at age 40.

Visitors can see original items relating to Flinders' life and exploration and chat to curator Paul Brunton, who is touring with the exhibition. He will give public talks and tours of the exhibition (details to come of dates). Original items include: various letters of correspondence between Flinders, Bass, Banks and Thomas Franklin, black and white engravings by landscape artist William Westall, and spoons used by naval officers on the *HMS Investigator*.

Visitors can also explore Australia's rich botanical history through the botanical and zoological drawings and watercolours produced from the Australian continent.

Go to www.slnsw.gov.au/flinders/ for digitised versions and transcripts of Flinders' logs and diaries, and a national calendar of events.

Matthew Flinders: The Ultimate Voyage is **FREE** at the Churchill Island Visitor Centre from (6 February) until 10 March 2002.

The Minister for Local Government has intimated a desire to officially launch the exhibition. Media outlets will be circularised with details as soon as the date is confirmed.
